School improvement


This school session, we are in the process of moving from a behaviour policy to a relational policy at Blackwood Primary School. We removed the traffic light system in school at the beginning of this term to support our restorative behaviour approach. What does this mean?

- At Blackwood Primary School in line with SLC policy, we are working towards becoming a more attachment informed school. Part of this work is to create a relational policy which will show a step-by-step approach to resolving issues and lay out the pupil, staff, and parental responsibilities ensuring this is a more collaborative approach to behaviour support across the school community. Mrs Bowman is currently leading this with the support of a working party in school.
- As part of this approach, all staff have been trained in Emotion coaching, the aim of this is to deliver a consistent approach in the language used to address children's feelings/emotions.
- We aim to recognise positive behaviour choices in school as almost all of our learners follow the school expectation each day to Be ready, Be Safe and Be Respectful. This is the ethos and culture that we promote and ask that this is instilled at home.
- A relational policy will be formed in consultation with parents/carers, pupils and staff which will be shared in due course.

World Book Day

Thursday 7th March is World Book Day, and we have lots of activities planned to celebrate this day and our love of reading at Blackwood Primary School. This year's theme is 'Read your way' and all pupils will be gifted a WBD book token which they can redeem in selected stores. In the ELC it will be a bright and colourful day. There will be a Literacy focus on the book Elmer and children are asked to dress in clothes that are their favourite colour. School uniform as normal for school. Activities in school and ELC that day have been planned by the Reading Leadership Committee alongside Mrs Colquhoun and include:

- A book swap Children are asked to bring a book in that they no longer read, and they can swap it to bring home a pre-loved book. (ELC – P7)
- A book bistro for (P5/4 P7)
- A character hunt around the school and playground (ELC-P7)
- Who's that behind the book can learners guess the staff member hiding behind the book?
- Library visit (P1-P4/3)
- Story session from SMT (P1-P4/3)



Sustrans Big Travel 11th - 22nd March

We have signed up to participate in Sustrans' Big Walk and Wheel which takes place between 11th and 22nd March. This initiative is the UK's largest walking, wheeling, scooting, and cycling challenge. It inspires pupils to make active journeys to school, improve air quality in their neighbourhood and discover how these changes benefit their world.

On each day of the challenge schools compete to see who can record the greatest number of pupils walking, using a wheelchair, scooting, or cycling to school. A school's best five days will determine their final position and schools at the top of their leaderboards will receive an exclusive Sustrans' Big Walk and Wheel certificate. Our JRSO leaders will survey classes each day to gather data to submit.

P1-P5's can scoot, walk, or cycle and P6 and P7's are encouraged to cycle, scoot or walk.

Residential

The Primary 6 and 7's had a fantastic experience at Newby Wiske on their residential trip. Thank you to the staff who accompanied the trip as this is a huge commitment from them to leave their family at home for the week and without their dedication this experience could not have happened. The aim is for each pupil to create a ppt of their week to be put on a Google classroom for you to access at home.

RSHP - Term 4

During Term 4 all classes will focus on the RSHP Programme Relationships, Sexual Health & Parenthood. This forms part of our Health and Well Being Curriculum and is uniform across Scotland with the launch of the national RSHP project which is linked to Curriculum for Excellence. The RSHP resource is an online resource and parents can access this at home to keep abreast of what your child is learning about in school. Forest Schools

This term, Primary 2 have been participating in Forest Schools where they have learned the importance of risk assessment and fire safety. They have developed their team working skills when den building, cooked hot dogs on the fire, looked for and identified minibeasts, used natural materials to make arts and crafts and used marshmallows and biscuits to make s'mores. Thursday 7th March will be their last session.









Cross Country

Primary 5, 6 and 7 are continuing with their Cross-Country training and a team has been selected to represent the school at the Clydesdale cross country competition on Wednesday 13th March. Cross Country is part of the core PE programme during term 3 and it is important that in order to meet our obligation to the Government of delivering a minimum of 2 hours of PE a week that all learners take part. It is not an opt in or out activity. We ask that parents/carers reinforce this message at home and the expectation is that unless children are unwell, they participate each week.
